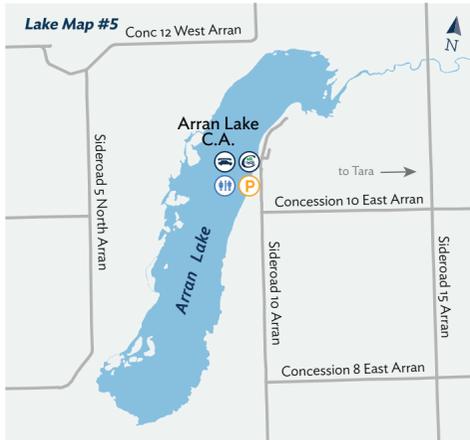
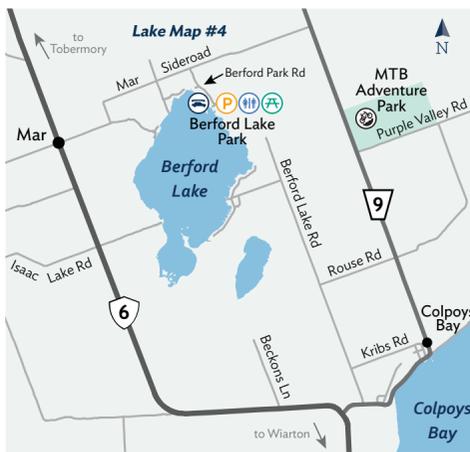

Arran Lake Lake Map #5

Arran Lake is popular for fishing, boating, hunting and swimming. It contains shallow marshy areas, and sections of vast open water. There is a public boat launch in the Arran Lake Conservation Area. To get to the access point, drive north out of Tara to Concession 10, East Arran. Then head west to the T intersection. Next, head north on Sideroad 10.

Level: easy to moderate



Berford Lake Lake Map #4

At Berford Lake Park, you'll find a sheltered picnic area, playground and a small sandy beach. Accessibility to the lake is limited to the park area.

Level: easy to moderate



Boat Lake Lake Map #3

Launch at Ranking River Access #3 on Bruce Road 13 between Oliphant and Warton. Continue your paddle north with the Lake Paddling Route. A porta potty is available at the access point.

Level: easy to moderate



Cameron Lake Lake Map #1

A picturesque, navigable strait connects Cameron Lake to Cyprus Lake, extending your paddling opportunity. Parking is located to the right of Beach Road, in the right-of-way. The beach provides a great access point to launch and cruise Cameron and Cyprus Lakes.

Level: easy to moderate



Cyprus Lake Lake Map #1

Home to the National Park's only campground, with 242 non-electrical sites, it's great home base for paddlers. Reservations are required for parking at the Cyprus Lake Campground. Book in advance at pc.gc.ca/grotto.

Level: easy to moderate



Emmett Lake Lake Map #1

Access via Emmett Lake Road, keeping right at the fork. Emmett Lake is a remote inland lake area with limited parking and no access to facilities. Day-use and parking fees apply. For more information visit pc.gc.ca.

Isaac Lake Lake Map #3

Launch onto Isaac Lake from the dock at the old Isaac Lake Fire Station (Access #2). There is a healthy community of pike, pickerel, perch and bass, making this lake popular amongst anglers. A porta potty is available at the access point.

Level: easy to moderate



Miller Lake Lake Map #2

Launch your boat at the western side of Miller Lake at the public boat launch. Rentals for canoes, kayaks, motorboats, SUP boards or use of boat launches are available at Miller's Family Camp or Summer House Park for a fee.

Sky Lake Lake Map #3

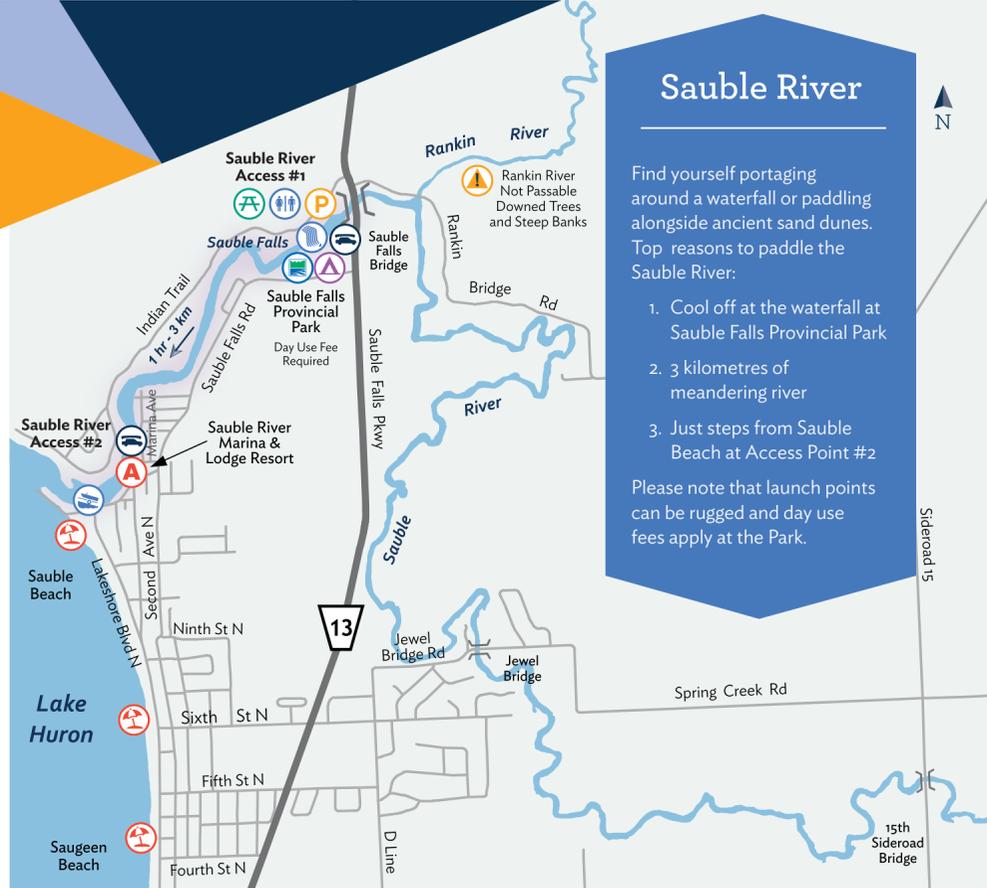
A boat launch on Sky Lake can be accessed off Red Bay Road. This is a rugged entrance point. Continue your paddle south with the Lake Paddling Route.

Level: easy to moderate



Tobermory's Open Water

For expert paddlers only. Tobermory is a working harbour and paddlers must give right-of-way to boats and the Chi-Cheemaun Ferry. The open waters of Lake Huron and Georgian Bay offer little shelter and few landing opportunities and contain deep, cold water. Wave conditions can change quickly. Paddlers must pick up a (free) permit from the Parks Canada Visitor Centre in Tobermory to paddle in the restricted waters of the Fathom Five National Marine Park.



Sauble River

Find yourself portaging around a waterfall or paddling alongside ancient sand dunes. Top reasons to paddle the Sauble River:

1. Cool off at the waterfall at Sauble Falls Provincial Park
2. 3 kilometres of meandering river
3. Just steps from Sauble Beach at Access Point #2

Please note that launch points can be rugged and day use fees apply at the Park.

Duration: 3 km / 1 hour Level: easy to moderate

Notes: Sauble River Marina & Lodge Resort located near Access Point #2 is a private access area option with rental fees.

RISKS

- River levels can change, be unpredictable and include heavy rapids. High and fast-flowing waters are common especially in early spring.
- Electronic devices such as GPS or mobile phones may not have reception in all areas. Download the What3Words app before you head out to help clearly share your exact location in the event of an emergency.
- Plan ahead and know the distance and time required to get to your end location.
- Please research the areas you are visiting and plan accordingly.
- Wave conditions of deep, cold water can change rapidly.
- Wash your water craft before and after boating to help prevent the spread of invasive species.
- Obstacles may be present along waterways. Be mindful and exercise caution when approaching.



The Expert Portaging Route Saugeen River Access 3 to 5

Duration: 20 km / 3 to 6 hours **Level:** challenging to expert
Portages: **Maple Hill Dam:** Portage (150 m) on the left (south) bank, upstream of the bridge. Exercise extreme caution when portaging across the road.
Hydro Dam: Portage (240 m) on the left (west) bank, upstream of the dam.

The Expert Portaging Route

The Walkerton to Paisley Route Saugeen River Access 5 to 9

Duration: 40 km / 6 to 11 hours **Level:** challenging to expert
Note: Exercise caution as rapids, large rocks and flood debris could be present. You'll find the McBeath Conservation Area at Access #8, which is home to serene backcountry camping.

Duration: 8.5 km / 1 to 2 hours **Level:** beginner to intermediate

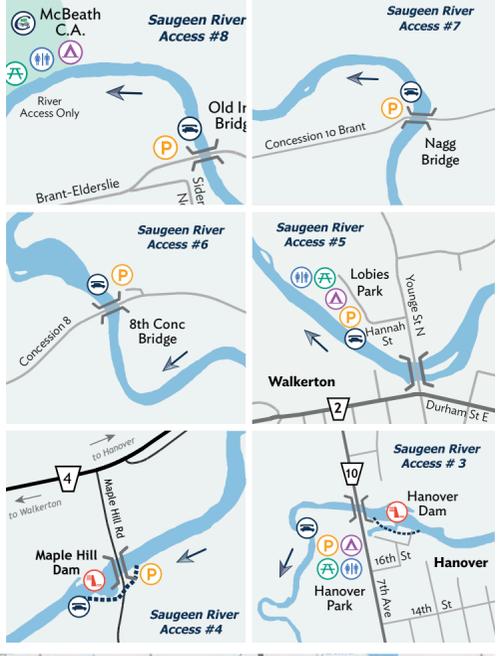
Saugeen River

The Saugeen River flows west through rolling scenic landscapes towards the Lake Huron shoreline. The route crosses a lot of agricultural land and is bordered by mixed forest and vegetation.

Why Paddle the Saugeen?

- Nearly 100 kilometres of river with 15 access points gives you an abundance of different routes
- Varying degrees of difficulty from wide, slow flowing sections to stretches with gentle rapids
- Local outfitters provide you with rental equipment and shuttles, making for a worry-free river experience
- Campgrounds and conservation areas along the river allow overnight stays and serve as a great starting point for a weekend adventure
- Home to the largest runs of migratory Rainbow Trout (steelheads) in Ontario

Bait, lure or fly?

Upstream from Lake Huron, you will find one of Ontario's best steelhead and Chinook salmon runs. Comprised of naturally sheltered feeder systems and spring-fed lakes, the Saugeen River system is an angler's heaven for brown and brook trout, largemouth and smallmouth bass, northern pike and musky. Consider supporting local fisheries by practising catch-and-release. Join volunteer-run fishing groups and organizations including the Ontario Steelheader's Association, Happy Trout Unlimited and the Lake Huron Fishing Club with hatcheries located in both Saugeen Shores and Kincardine.
